



Encouraging Conversation

I Wonder Why...?

Beginner: Talk about your daily tasks as you complete them.

[Tip]: "I'm putting on your socks. Next let's put your shirt over your head and stick your arms through."

Intermediate: Ask questions about things you do together. Encourage them to answer in words or sentences.

[Tip]: What are we doing today? ...tomorrow? ...yesterday?

Experienced: Ask questions that encourage creative thinking and imagination. Avoid questions that lead to "yes" and "no" answers.

[Tip]: Why do cats have whiskers? Why do leaves fall from trees? Why is there a light in the fridge?

Why is this important? Vocabulary supports reading skills. Children who are encouraged to speak about things at an early age through questions are better equipped to understand the world around them.
