



Spelling with Nature

What Can You Find?

Beginner: Go for a walk and collect natural items. Talk about the name of each item you pick up. [Tip]: Lay the natural items on the ground in the shape of the first letter of the child's name.

Intermediate: Go for a walk and collect natural items. Lay out the items on the ground in the shape of each letter of their name.

[Tip]: Using items like rocks and sticks, model the letters and have your child copy you.

Experienced: Go for a walk and collect natural items. Have your child lay the items out to spell their name or other sight words.

Why is this important? Physically manipulating objects to form letters and words activates whole brain learning, improves recall skills, and contributes to reading skills.
